Welcome Address at the Opening Ceremony by Yohei Mimura, Chairman, IDE

Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Thank you very much for participating in the Tokyo Symposium on “The Present and Future of the Pacific Basin Economy: A Comparison of Asia and Latin America.” As one of the members of the organizing committee and also on behalf of the IDE let me say a few words.

First of all, I would like to express my heartfelt welcome and appreciation to the overseas participants including leading scholars, intellectuals and representatives of international organizations from 14 countries and regions of Asia, Latin America, U.S.A. and Europe, for their willingness to participate in the symposium. I am very pleased to see that many Japanese experts who play an important role in various fields are taking part in the symposium. I am also grateful for the invaluable assistance and cooperation extended by MITI for the organization of the symposium.

The IDE was established in July 1960 to conduct basic research and studies on developing countries. We are the only government-affiliated agency of its kind. Since then IDE has been involved in various research activities and exchanges of international information for 29 years and it will mark the 30th anniversary of its foundation in 1990. So far through the dissemination of research results and organization of extensive international research network, IDE has contributed to the development of economic and trade relations between Japan and developing nations in Asia and other regions, and also to the promotion of economic cooperation and mutual understanding among nations and people.

Based on these experiences, IDE held in 1988 a Tokyo Conference on “The Global Adjustment and the Future of the Asian Pacific Economy,” cosponsored with APDC. This year, IDE organized the Tokyo Symposium on “The Present and Future of the Pacific Basin Economy: A Comparison of Asia and Latin America,” under the sponsorship of the Asian Club Foundation.

As you all know, international political and economic systems after World War II experienced important changes as illustrated in the changes in the East-West relations and North-South issues, and a new framework for the systems is being explored. The 15th Summit Meeting was just held in Paris from July 14th through 16th, where proposals were made on the urgent need of capital recycling and technical cooperation by the industrialized economies to facilitate external debt reduction for developing countries and global environmental preservation. Today, the

world economy is in a serious state of imbalance. With great fluctuations of key currencies, budget deficits, substantial trade imbalances and increased external debts, how to achieve balanced development of the world economy is a major task we all face.

At this Tokyo Symposium we will attempt to address these issues and analyze the differences in the economic development between the Pacific Basin countries and Latin American countries and explore a possible orientation of the development strategies and economic cooperation that will ensure long term growth of each nation.

Compared with other developing nations, the Asia-Pacific nations enjoy sustained high economic growth under political stability. Hopefully we can also discuss ways to promote regional cooperation in view of the recent political turbulence in China and its implications as well as our contribution to revitalize the world economy.

Perhaps this is the first time that intellectuals from Asia and Latin America have met together in Japan and had the opportunity to talk about the present issues and the future of the Pacific Basin economy.

Starting from today for the next three days, various reports will be presented and discussions will be held in eight different sessions.

In concluding my remarks, I sincerely hope that this international conference will be fruitful through active and candid discussions and exchanges of opinions. Once again I would like to extend my heartfelt welcome and appreciation to all the participants representing various governments, business circles, and academia. Thank you very much.

I would like to express my heartfelt welcome to our overseas participants for joining us here in Tokyo. My name is Akira Amari, Parliamentary Vice Minister for the Ministry of International Trade and Industry. I would like to welcome all of you on behalf of Minister Kajiyama to the opening of the symposium on "the Present and Future of the Pacific Basin Economy."

In the Asia-Pacific region, Asian nations such as the ASEAN countries and the Asian NIEs are experiencing a high level of economic growth and strong economic development. The main cause of such vitality may lie in the fact that each country has overcome many difficulties by actively pursuing economic development, in which domestic investment and exports complement one another.

The Pacific Basin region, however, is facing a variety of problems such as the increase in the debt of Latin American countries and large U.S. twin deficits. In order for the Pacific Basin economies to contribute even more to the world economy, the achievement of balanced economic development in this region becomes extremely important. In order to deal with these issues, it is essential that the Pacific Basin countries build a multifaceted, and multi-layered economic relationship by expanding their trade, improving the infrastructure for industrial development, dealing appropriately with energy and environmental issues, and promoting international division of labor.

In order to achieve these objectives, Japan is now making utmost efforts to generate domestic demand-led growth, and is proceeding with industrial structural adjustment. At the same time, Japan is actively promoting comprehensive economic cooperation where assistance, investment, and trade complement one another.

The Pacific Basin region is now entering an age of development through open cooperation. Through the promotion of such open cooperation, as we move into the 21st century, we should encourage this region to achieve its full growth potential, and by doing so, contribute not only to the development of the region but also to that of the world economy. I believe that this symposium is indeed timely as the participants represent the EC, 14 countries of the Pacific Basin, and 6 international organizations.

Through the knowledge and extensive experience of those taking part in this symposium and through frank and candid exchanges of views, I hope that we can reach an understanding of the form which cooperation should assume in the Pacific Basin region in the 21st century as well as the role countries in this region should play, including Japan.

Finally, I hope that the symposium will be successful and that our overseas visitors will enjoy their stay in Japan and enhance their understanding of the Japanese economy and society.
